Adinath Kevaljnana Kalyanak Maha Vad Agiyaras

On this day, Jains try & do at least one 'mala' reciting:

"Om Hrim Shri Adinath Sarvagnay Namah"

One thousand years, after taking diksha, Adinath attained kevaljnana, under a banyan tree in the Shakatmukh garden, outside Purimtal town, near the city of Ayodhya. He had 84 gandharas, the chief gandhara was his grandson – Rishabhasen – also known as Pundarik



Adinath Bhagwan Pratima Shikharbandhi Jinalaya Oshwal Centre As per our scriptures, Bhagwan Adinath is considered as the Rushbhdev , the first Tirthankara of the current Chauvisi – 24 Tirthankaras and first ruling King. He had 12 previous lives and became a Tirthankara in his 13th birth. He was born in Ayodhya, during the Yuglik era as the son of the patriarch Nabhi and his queen Marudevi. He was named Rsabha as he bore the mark of a bull on his thigh and his mother – Marudevi – saw a bull in her first dream. He is also referred to by other names including Rishabdev, Rishabh, Adishwar, Rishabhdeva, Adishvar, Vṛṣabhanātha, Rṣabhadeva, Rṣabhanātha, mata Marudevi na nand

Jain tradition holds that all civilization developed from the teachings of Adinath and is credited with setting up the customs and institutions of society, including marriage, farming, crafts, reading, writing and mathematics.

He was married to Sunanda and Sumangala and had 100 sons, including Bharata and Bahubali and 2 daughters – Brahmi & Sundari.

He was the first person to renounce his worldly life to become a Jain ascetic. Adinath attained Nirvana (moksha) at Mount Ashtapad together with 10,000 additional Jain ascetics.
